#### From the Rector

As one might expect, our new Bishop – John Taylor – has shared a theme for the coming year – "Welcome home." The theme covers a number of initiatives and concerns.

One element refers to the ongoing work of reconciliation following the tumultuous final years of Bishop Bruno's tenure. The diocese has engaged the services of the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center to facilitate educational opportunities around family systems theory and listening/story telling sessions to help the various parties involved or party to the conflict that emerged surrounding the disposition of the church property in Newport Beach come to some sense of beginning anew.

Still another element is engaging in the larger issues around housing, including the dilemma of homelessness, affordable housing, and transitions for seniors.

At a more basic level, the theme of "Welcome home" speaks to the opportunity in front of us to embrace newcomers to our congregations. Bishop Taylor believes, and I concur, that there is a whole new generation of seekers who are ready to fall in love with the Episcopal Church. I would ask us all to

consider what makes the Episcopal Church, and Ascension in particular, "home." And then ask ourselves, who do we know and care enough about, to invite them home?

#### Vestry Focus - Expanding Our Role as "the Village Church"

At our February and March meetings, your Vestry members have focused on determining what Ascension's goal should be for 2018. I'd like to share with you some of our conclusions.

Our 2018 focus will be on expanding our role as "The Village Church." We believe that we need to reach beyond our campus and out into the local community and beyond.

We already have several existing outreach projects including the ER&D Pig Project, the ER&D Lent Offering, the current re-organization of the Parish Meal Train for our own families, and now the ECPAC Clothing Drive which will start on April 8<sup>th</sup>.

In submitting Ascension's Parochial Report for Vestry approval, Father Michael pointed out that as a result of the many 12 steps groups that use the Parish House, we are touching the lives of approximately 1100 people each year.

Over the coming months, we will be looking into several suggested projects including Laundry Love, continued participation in Habitat for Humanity work days, providing Senior Care Services for our own parishioners, creating homeless bags for ECPAC food distribution, and finding some way Ascension can be part of addressing the Homeless Crisis.

We welcome any suggestions you may have as to ways we can reach out to others.

#### NOTES FROM THE LOFT

Happy Easter! Your Ascension musicians look forward to bringing you an April 1 service of magnificent music, which we have been privileged to rehearse for the past several weeks. Our festival choir will be joined by trumpeter Carlos Ramos and oboist Sean Dougall to present:

Most Glorious Lord of Life, a relatively new anthem by John Rutter; Festival setting of We Know that Christ Has Died, for congregation and choir; Awake, My Lute, music by Jane Marshall, poetry by George Herbert; Fanfare and Easter Hymn, as always!

At the 10:15 service I'll be opening with Easter Morning, written by late nineteenth-early twentieth century Danish composer, Otto Malling – I think you'll be able to discern the musical symbolism of this work. Trumpeter Carlos Ramos will then join me in the exciting Marche Joyeuse by John H. Head, contemporary composer from Kensington, Liverpool. Both services will conclude, per usual, with the Widor Toccata in F Major from Symphony No. 5.

April 8 – Second Sunday of Easter (Thomas Sunday)

How Shall I Sing that Majesty, arranged by John Ronald Daniels; Walter Pelz' lush setting of Peace I Leave With You.

<u>April 15</u> – Third Sunday of Easter

Now the Green Blade Rises - traditional French tune, arranged by Alan Bullard; David Ashley White's O God Unseen.

April 22 – Fourth Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday)

The Lord's My Shepherd by contemporary British composer, Bob Chilcott;

The popular Shepherd Me, O God, by Marty Haugen.

April 29 – Fifth Sunday of Easter

Contemporary American composer Bruce Bengston's O Sing to the Lord A New Song; If Ye Love Me by sixteenth century composer, Thomas Tallis.

As I review the above-mentioned anthems, each of which carries its own special significance, I must express my deep appreciation to:

~our Ascension choristers and oboist Sean Dougall, without whom none of the above would be possible – it's my distinct privilege to make music with you;

~our Easter guest singers and trumpeter, who add a certain magnificence to our choral music; ~all who have contributed to the Easter music fund, making such music possible.

Do you have a junk drawer in your house? You know, a drawer that serves as a catch-all for all those items you find lying around — the random key, marble, screw, book mark? Don't know where to put something...put it in the junk drawer. We all have them. Maybe yours is in a desk or somewhere in the garage or kitchen. Personally, I have a few and I just located another — the glove box in my car.

Stuff we don't know what to do with we hide in our junk drawers. But what about the people in our lives that we want to hide? Where do they go? Instead of the junk drawer,

let's call it our "relational" drawer. The relational drawer is the place where we put the people who baffle, annoy, irritate, or scare us. It's that place in our heart where we stow people we can't get out of our life, but whom we'd rather not deal with at the moment—or ever. It's the dark place in our hearts where we stuff people when we don't know how to deal with their quirks or shortcomings.

This month we'll consider why we have physical junk drawers. In May, we'll consider our rational junk drawers: why we have them and the problems with them. But let's not get ahead of ourselves. What about those junk drawers and what do they all have in common?

The junk drawer is the spot where we put something when we don't know where else to put it. It's the spot where we hide stuff because we like to appear neat and orderly on the outside. It's the spot where we leave items because it's easier to throw something in a drawer than it is to put it in its proper place. In other words, we're a bit lazy at times.

And like our refrigerators when the door is closed or in the case of when the junk drawer is closed, it's dark. Or is it?




