#### From the Rector

It has been over two years since Bishop John Taylor directed that congregations across the Diocese of Los Angeles should administer Eucharist in one kind. For many of our parishioners, giving up the Common Chalice was a painful sacrifice which was as hard to bear as the stretches when we were not able to gather in person.

Bishop Taylor has recently given the go ahead for us to resume receiving Eucharist in both kinds, beginning Palm Sunday – April 10<sup>th</sup>. Our folks here at Ascension will have essentially three options. The first option is to continue to receive in one kind. The second option is to receive from the common cup. (Please keep in mind that our

chalices are made of precious metals which have an anti-microbial quality. Also, we use sacramental wine which is higher in alcohol content. After each person receives, the chalice is turned and wiped with the linen called a purificator.) A third option will be for individuals and households to receive from a small chalice into which a small amount of consecrated wine will be poured from the common cruet. Folks may choose to bring from home a glass or cup that holds special significance or to use a small glass which we will have available. Please note — the practice of Intinction (when a parishioner dips the bread in the wine) is not permitted under the diocesan guidelines.

In addition, we are going to resume passing the collection plate at the offertory and return to having the elements – the bread and wine – brought forward by the ushers. All of these changes are dependent on Southern California not experiencing another surge of Covid cases. From the outset, I have always held the health and safety of our community as a primary concern. Like all of you, I long for a return to "normal." Looking forward to a blessed Easter,

During the time he spent in the wilderness, Jesus was stretched to the limits of his imagination. We, too, often find ourselves in the wilderness with our imaginations stretched to the limits.

The gospels most definitely stretch us to the limits of our imaginations, particularly when tasking us to love our enemies. Easier said than done; but Jesus was very clear when he said, "love your enemies." Before loving our enemies, it might be easier to simply pray for them. That alone might well stretch many of us to the limits of our imaginations.

It goes without saying that currently the most despised man on the planet hands down is Vladimir Putin...yes, him! It's doubtful that any of us would invite him to sit at our table for dinner. But I can't speak for Jesus.

I know I should pray for him. Yes, even him, the man who is responsible for the misplacement of families, children, the death of thousands of innocent Ukrainians, and who is putting the future of the world at risk, who because of his cruel and inhuman actions, we lay awake at night frightened and wondering how far the insanity will go. Yes, him.

But I'm struggling because if I cannot pray grudgingly, ragingly, reluctantly, furiously, confusedly, complicatedly for his shattered soul, what is the point of praying at all!

But there must have been a shred of holiness in the man, at least originally; there must have been a small, shriveled soul once. Maybe there was some small shivering moment much later when he sat at that long table in the Kremlin, when he felt a flicker of shame at what he's doing, at how he is wasting his life, killing innocents, destroying cities, and endangering his own people.

I hope so. I pray. I pray that somewhere, somehow, sometimes he weeps for his copious sins. Mr. Putin is a Christian. He was baptized into the Russian Orthodox Church as a boy, which wasn't all that common back in the Soviet era. His father, who worked for the NKVD (the predecessor of the KGB), was an atheist; but his mother was a devoted Christian and raised Vladimir in the faith. Putin himself has said that he became a practicing Orthodox Christian in 1993 when he was 41 years old. He openly supports the church, even using the instruments of government to promote it.

Thomas Merton writes that: "it's a risky thing to pray and the danger is that our very prayers get between God and us. The great thing in prayer is not to pray, but to go directly to God. . . ." The fact is, though, that if you descend into the depths of your own spirit and arrive somewhere near the center of what you are, you are confronted with the inescapable truth that at the very root of your existence, you are in constant and immediate contact with the infinite power of God.

I pray that Putin's dark energy is dissolved by mercy and cleansed by love. I pray that I am right in believing that there is forgiveness bigger than any sin and that somehow in ways I do not understand but believe in with awe and a little fear, that you Lord, find a chamber in your heart for even him. Yes, him and me too. And so: Amen.

Be well, be blessed, stretch yourself to the limits of your imagination, take risks, pray for the least likeable, be in immediate contact with the infinite power of God.

#### Bring Bells on Easter Day!

Easter is a time for joyous bell ringing. Once again, I encourage everyone to bring bells - bells of all sorts and sizes - to the Easter Day services. We ring them during the first singing of the Gloria in excelsis and with gusto during the singing of the hymn "Jesus Christ is Risen Today."


During Eastertide, instead of ringing the Angelus on the large bell at the conclusion of the service, we will ring the Regina Coeli. This joyful devotion dates from the 12<sup>th</sup> century and invites us to rejoice with Mary at the Resurrection. The text is –

Queen of Heaven, rejoice, alleluia. The Son whom you merited to bear, alleluia. Has risen, as He said, alleluia. Pray for us to God, alleluia. V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia.

R. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray. O God, who through the resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ gave rejoicing to the world, grant, we pray, that through his Mother, the Virgin Mary, we may obtain the joy of everlasting life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The bell will ring four sets of two strokes, with pauses between each set, followed by eight peals. As in most things, this devotion is only one option in the broad spectrum of personal piety.

#### Forward Today: The neglected commandment

Dear friends in Christ,

I lead a Bible study on Tuesday evenings. Not long ago, we looked at the Ten Commandments in Exodus. One of the things we talked about is how we mostly respect and try to keep nine of the commandments. We don't murder, steal, or lie. Or at least we agree that those things are bad!



But we don't rest very well, do we? Christians have varied understanding of what Sabbath means and how to keep it. But in the Ten Commandments and elsewhere throughout the Old Testament, it's pretty clear that God wants his people to rest! There are myriad ways this is lived out in the scriptures. Jesus, too, kept the Sabbath, though he sometimes got into squabbles about how to keep it.

Jesus rested. He kept the Sabbath – though perhaps not the way others expected. God commands rest. Jesus rested. So why is it so hard for us?

In short, our culture promotes the idol of productivity. We live in a world that teaches us that our value comes from what we produce or accomplish. But that's antithetical to the Gospel. The Gospel teaches us that we are precious regardless of what we produce. The scriptures say that we are worthy of God's love and redeeming grace.

Taking a day to rest – not to check off a list of errands, but to really rest – is countercultural. When someone asks you what you're doing today, try answering, "Nothing. I'm resting." See what kind of reaction you get!

The pandemic has blurred lines of home and work. We all need rest more than ever, and it's harder than ever to get away. I hope you'll find a way to rest regularly. God literally made us hardwired to benefit from the gift of rest. When we rest, we can simply enjoy our creation and preservation by almighty God. We can remember what is truly important.

At Forward Movement, we try to model the practices of discipleship. We pray every day at the office. We practice generosity by giving away thousands of free books and booklets every year. We study the Bible together. And we rest.

We rest in several ways. Our lay staff and clergy have taken sabbaticals. Our full-time staff have every other Friday off, yielding a three-day weekend. We work hard while we're on duty, but we also do our best to give folks time away from work for family time and other activities.

This week, we've closed our office. All week long, Monday through Friday, our whole staff is enjoying a week of refreshment and rest after a very stressful few months with pandemic-related issues. I hope you'll say a word of prayer to give thanks for my hard-working and amazing colleagues at Forward Movement, that they can rest well. We love our work, and that's why we're all taking a few days away from it.

How are you doing at rest? How is your church doing? Can you allow your hard-working and probably exhausted staff and clergy to have some real rest time?

Rest. It is God's command, and God's commandments are good for us and for our world. Rest.
