The Pledge Campaign Approaches

August in Southern California is when thoughts turn to things like how to stay cool, a last chance vacation before the kids go back to school, baseball pennant races (Go Dodgers!), and the stewardship pledge drive. Wait . . . what was that last one?

Yes, your Vestry has been thinking about stewardship this summer, and so here is our first Spire article on the 2018 pledge campaign. Why so early? It really isn't. Where I work, all the Directors who manage sections of our Law Department had to submit budget forecasts not only for the remainder of this year and next, but for the four years after that. In other words, we really have to look ahead to stay on track. So too does the Vestry. Now don't worry, we are not going to ask parishioners to make pledges for the next five years. But looking ahead to 2019 requires us to anticipate, with some precision, what revenue will be next year. To do that, we are readying our pledge campaign now.

Stewardship, of course, is not just monetary giving. As you know, we give to God in many ways commonly identified as worship, outreach, formation, fellowship, pastoral care, and presence. Each is an equal pillar in the foundation of the parish and the church. Monetary giving, however, requires a different type of planning and a different schedule. The Vestry would be irresponsible not to recognize that.

Therefore, our stewardship focus at this time in the calendar will be on pledging. During Lent and through Easter, we will focus on the time and talent aspects of stewardship. None is less important than the other; and, indeed, each is integral to the other (just try to imagine Sunday service without the work of the Altar Guild for example). But the timing is different, and now through October is pledging's time. That means you will be seeing numbers and budgets, financial goals and challenges, and requests for commitment with eternal thanks for past support.

We hope you will give this thought as well and tell us what you think over the next month. Ask questions, request information, and make suggestions. Vestry members (Jean Rowe, Gordon Tomaske, Dan Hanson, Bill Voegeli, Natalie Dougall, Marie Prentice, Tim Hayden, Mark Keith and yours truly) are eager for your queries and ideas.

Every now and again we all do something that makes a lot of sense. The road to that decision isn't always easy. Many of us are dealing with elderly loved ones who are in need of special care, and the solution to these challenges can be perplexing and costly. Too often there seem to be more questions than answers.

This dilemma became all too real for me in 2005 the year after my dad passed away. My mom's health was starting to fail, and it was becoming obvious that she couldn't handle living longer. It was the beginning of a long and difficult journey from selling their home, undating

alone in their home much longer. It was the beginning of a long and difficult journey from selling their home, updating trusts, consolidating finances, assisted living, and eventually a skilled nursing facility. I was up to the challenge of making sure Mom got the best care possible, but the financial challenges were overwhelming. Sound familiar?

In sharing my concerns with a family member, I got some really good advice. Actually, it wasn't just good advice; it was the best advice I may have ever received. If this article is starting to sound like an infomercial, well, it is in a way. The advice was clear and simple...call an elder care attorney. Making this call has become my standard advice to anyone who tells me that they're in this situation with a loved one. Here's a little information I found on the internet to get you more familiar with elder care law.

Elder law attorneys are advocates for the elderly and their loved ones. Most elder law attorneys handle a wide range of legal matters affecting an older or disabled person, including issues related to health care, long term care planning, guardianship, retirement, Social Security, Medicare/Medicaid, and other important matters.

In many ways, elder law attorneys are "specialists" because of their focus on the needs of older adults, which are often different and more specialized than the needs of younger adults. Not only can they handle important financial and estate planning matters, but they also take care of day-to-day issues affecting the actual care of seniors, such as assisted living and life planning.

In addition, elder law attorneys are often more equipped to handle the sensitive emotional and physical needs of older or disabled adults and are therefore able to handle a variety of challenging situations.

How Can an Elder Law Attorney Help Me?

An elder law attorney can help with any one of the following:

- Discuss the importance of wills and <u>estate planning</u>, including planning for a minor or adult with special needs, probate proceedings, and other matters.
- Create a durable power of attorney.
- Provide help with <u>health care and planning</u>, including long term care options, patient rights, Medicare, and health care power of attorney.
- Financial representation: financial planning (including <u>durable financial power of attorney</u>), housing opportunities and planning, income, estate, and gift tax matters.
- <u>Guardianship</u>: help with the selection and appointment of a legal guardian.
- Help locate long term care facilities and manage assisted living cost.
- Explain nursing home resident rights and help file nursing home claims.
- Draft a living will or other <u>advance directives</u>, including a durable power of attorney and long term planning documents.


The 2018 Parish Directory is now available.

According to the presiding bishop's family and his medical team, the surgery went well, as had been expected. Bishop Curry is resting, and a full recovery continues to be anticipated. On July 25 Curry shared news that he had recently been diagnosed with prostate cancer and would be having surgery to remove the prostate gland.

Curry and his family are touched by the outpouring of prayers and well wishes. In their thankfulness, they ask for privacy during his recovery.

An Invitation from Presiding Bishop Michael B. Curry to Practice the Way of Love



I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. – Ephesians 3:17-19

In the first century Jesus of Nazareth inspired a movement. A community of people whose lives were centered on Jesus Christ and committed to living the way of God's unconditional, unselfish, sacrificial, and redemptive love. Before they were called "church" or "Christian," this Jesus Movement was simply called "the way."


Today I believe our vocation is to live as the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement. But how can we together grow more deeply with Jesus Christ at the center of our lives, so we can bear witness to his way of love in and for the world?

The deep roots of our Christian tradition may offer just such a path. For centuries, monastic communities have shaped their lives around rhythms and disciplines for following Jesus together. Such a pattern is known as a "Rule of Life." The framework you now hold – **The Way of Love: Practices for Jesus-Centered Life** – outlines a Rule for the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement.

It is designed to be spare and spacious, so that individuals, ministry groups, congregations, and networks can flesh it out in unique ways and build a church-wide treasure trove of stories and resources. There is no specific order you need to follow. If you already keep a Rule or spiritual disciplines, you might reflect and discover how that path intersects with this one. By entering into reflection, discernment and commitment around the practices of **Turn - Learn - Pray - Worship - Bless - Go - Rest**, I pray we will grow as communities following the loving, liberating, life-giving way of Jesus. His way has the power to change each of our lives and to change this world.

GO: Cross boundaries, listen deeply and live like Jesus
