### From the Rector

Headlines over the past several weeks have prompted some folks to ask how they can help – whether it is for disasters nearby and farther away, the situation at the border, or the seeming increase of homeless folks in our neighborhoods. Even though some of these concerns are complicated, our impulse as Christians should be to try to do something.

With regard to disaster relief, you all know my pet cause – Episcopal Relief and Development. They are supporting long-term recovery efforts in Texas, the Central Gulf Coast, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Nebraska, Northern California, as well as internationally in Africa and Asia. You can easily make a contribution online or by mail.

With regard to the situation at the border, there are a couple of ways to help. Episcopal Migration Ministries is supporting several congregations which are located in the heavily impacted areas and doing hands-on work to help families get where they need to go. The crisis of homelessness seems so very daunting. One very practical effort is to join in supporting the work of Friends Indeed. We collect food, toiletries, and other items to support their work. Looking east, the Foothill Unity Center in Monrovia does fine work as well. Our new Diocesan Discerner – Tim Hamlin (who will be starting with us in September) - works for a non-profit agency which supports folks who are recently housed after having been homeless; and I'm sure he'll have some concrete ideas to share with us.

### NOTES FROM THE LOFT

On July 14 I worshipped at St. Thomas of Canterbury Episcopal Church in Temecula and was introduced to Dr. Stephen Sturk, Director of Music, who, incidentally, is also the composer-in-residence at St. Paul's, San Diego. This introduction led to, well ~ Dr. Sturk had composed an oratorio entitled *One Small Step* in honor of the  $50^{\text{th}}$  anniversary of the moon landing, which was to be premiered at the California Arts Center in Escondido the following Saturday evening, the  $20^{\text{th}}$ . #### CHURCH OF THE ASCENSION THANKS MARTHANN MULLEAVY FOR THE PERRY RESTORATION PROJECT

With over a year of dedicated work behind us, Ascension has seen the completion of the Perry Restoration Project. This project was a direct result of Marthann Mulleavy's vision and commitment to repair and restore Ascension's deteriorated exterior elements, ensuring that our beloved historic sanctuary will continue to serve our church family and remain an essential Sierra Madre landmark well into the future. At our 2017 annual meeting, Marthann Mulleavy expressed her concern over the state of the church's physical condition and committed to funding the restoration of a number of critical areas including trim, mortar, and rock facing. Over the last year, Marthann's passion has been translated into a tangible restoration. Highlights of this effort include:

• Weakened mortar around the stone base of the church has been cleaned and replaced in a manner consistent with the unique, square application of the original








• The 130+ year old door south of the altar has been carefully and fully restored using only age appropriate vintage hardware



• Trim has been cleaned, patched, and repainted







• New planting under the bell tower is now complete with drip lines



• The rock panels on the south side of the church have been removed, cleaned, restored, and replaced

- Five stained glass windows have been removed, reconditioned, and returned; and their frames have been restored



- Replacement of the lens on the 3ft light post near Baldwin has been completed
- Repair of the loft window in Hawks Hall has been completed
- Re-bedding of the rose garden, including adding 9 roses and a new watering system, is now in place



• The office door also received attention inside and out, including the replacement of 3 plastic panes with vintage "old glass"

We note that this work was largely completed for our Easter celebration, providing our congregation with a wonderfully restored space for both our indoor and outdoor worship.

We also note that this work is but the first in a series of projects beautifying our church including the clean-up of the memorial garden, patching and repainting the masonry area at the front of the Church facing Baldwin Avenue, and replacing the stucco bases under the Church's outside benches. The walkway/ramp leading to the office door has been pressure washed and repainted, and the Gooden school has added a raised bed garden for the 1st grade class.

With this work now complete, the Ascension Church family thanks Marthann for her vision, generosity, and determination in seeing this project move from concept to completion to the benefit of this generation and those to come.



Bishop John Harvey Taylor and Canon Kathy O'Connor are pleased to invite all members of the diocesan community to the second annual Bishop's Concert, featuring Grammy Award-winning singer, actor and

author Debby Boone, on Friday, October 11 at the episcopal residence, located at 3435 E. California Boulevard in Pasadena.

Debby Boone is known for the 1977 hit "You Light Up My Life" (watch and listen to a 2013 performance here ), her 1980 country song "Are You On the Road to Lovin' Me Again," and albums of country music, contemporary Christian songs, and songs for children. In 2005 she released Reflections Of Rosemary , an album featuring music that her mother-in-law, Rosemary Clooney, performed as well as other songs that Boone felt reflected the woman her family knew. Boone also has appeared in many musical theater productions, television series and movies, and has written several children's books illustrated by her husband, the Rev. Gabriel Ferrer, vicar of St. Martin's Church, Winnetka.
