### From the Rector

At time for tradition in worship, I will be mentioning the idea of taking on some practice during Advent to help prepare the way in ourselves for the coming of the Christ. Some folks use traditional devices – Advent Calendars – to daily note the countdown until Christmas. There ARE some Advent Calendars that don't involve bits of chocolate.

There are books of meditations for Advent. A few years ago, many people enjoyed the booklet written by Francisco Garcia published by the Forward Movement Press. Check out <u>forwardmovement.org</u> for their resources or even Google "Advent meditations."

Another Advent devotion is to practice intentional generosity. I'm planning to do a lot of little gift giving for Christmas online daily through the Episcopal Relief and Development website.

My friend and colleague Bruce Linsenmayer along with Episcopal Relief and Development has come up with a devotional (and PRACTICAL) approach called a Season of Resilience. (http://www.episcopalrelief.org/uploads/EducationFileModel/159/file/SoR-fullpage.pdf) It is a one week at a time routine of accumulating everything needed for a home disaster preparedness cache. Theologically, this is brilliant. Advent is all about getting ready.

The weeks leading up to Christmas can be joyous and maddening. For some it is a time of secular and commercial craziness. I pray that we can find it a period of deeper anticipation of the dawning of God's grace and love in our lives and in the world.

#### A few notes to keep in mind:


- \* Items need to be at Ascension by Monday, December 11.

# 2018 Stewardship Pledge Drive Update



- 2018 Pledge Goal \$237,000
- Pledged Income as of November 30 \$195,377
- Pledge Deficit as of November 30 \$41,623
- 2018 tentative budget with the projected elimination of earthquake insurance and the childcare/kitchen help position \$310,299 (2017 budget total was \$335,669)

The stewardship campaign is not complete until December 31 - your Vestry continues to hope for a good response from those who have yet to pledge, from those who might consider raising their pledge, and from those considering giving an end of the year gift.

Vestry will vote on accepting the 2018 budget at their December 19th meeting.

If you are a lover of Alfred Burt's carols, that title should remind you of the refrain from his carol "Come Dear Children." But the carol that keeps running through my head at night is another called "We'll Dress the House."

I first thought of the carol the night when I got to thinking about how so many people get caught up in all the things that they think must be done for a successful secular holiday. It makes me sad when I hear someone express dread at the approach of the season – not because of the loss of family members or sad memories, but for all they have to do.



Alfred Burt, in contrast, brings out the joy of all the aspects of preparation. He rejoices in the various stages of our preparation for "A Blessed Christmas."

Describing the preparation of the house and the wrapping of gifts, he reminds us that all that we do should be a sign of gladness.

We'll dress the house with holly bright; And sprigs of mistletoe. We'll trim the Christmas tree tonight And set the lights aglow. We'll wrap our gifts with ribbons gay And give them out on Christmas Day. By everything we do and say Our gladness we will show.

As the actual day arrives, he shifts to the preparation of the table and the special dishes that are made only at Christmas time.

> We'll dress the table daintily, Our finest treasures use, That all a-sparkle it may be And bright with lovely hues. Then for the feasting we'll prepare A kitchen full of wondrous fare, That each from all the dishes rare, His fav'rite one may choose.

It seems to me that whenever I ask someone "how ya doing," the response usually includes "oh, I'm so busy." If the holidays aren't enough to get "our busy" going, consider all the distractions of everyday life.... emails, texts, appointments, traffic, run here run there, chauffeur the kids, playdates, and,of course, endless to-do lists. How many of us add accomplishments to our lists that weren't there originally just to feel that we actually got something done? Can I see a show of hands, please?

It seems to me that we have forgotten that we are human beings, not human doings. How did we end up living like this? Why do we do this to ourselves and to our children? Whatever happened to a world in which kids get muddy, get dirty, and ,heaven forbid, bored? We seem hell bent on stressing out not only ourselves but our children too.

What happened to a world in which we can sit with the people we love and have slow, thoughtful conversations about the state of our heart and soul - conversations with pregnant pauses and silences that we are in no rush to fill. How did we create a world in which we have more and more and more to do with less time for leisure, less time for reflection, less time for community, less time to just... be?

The columnist Omid Safi writes "in many Muslim cultures, when you want to ask someone how they're doing, you ask in Arabic, *Kayf haal-ik?* or, in Persian, *Haal-e shomaa chetoreh?* How is your *haal*? What is this *haal* that you inquire about? It is the transient state of one's heart. In reality, we ask, "How is your heart doing at this very moment, at this breath?" When I ask, "How are you?" that is really what I want to know.

Antoine de Saint-Exupéry the author of *The Little Prince* puts it this way:

"And now here is my secret, a very simple secret; it is only with the heart that one can see rightly, what is essential is invisible to the eye."

The most valuable things in life cannot be seen with the naked eye: love, friendship, hope, integrity, trust, compassion. Our eyes enable us to read our endless to-do lists, but only our hearts retransform us into human beings from human doings.

So, if you're not too busy this Christmas and are lucky enough to run into Jesus, be prepared, for he'll probably ask you "Kayfhallik." And if you're really brave, you might ask Jesus the same.
