

From the Rector

I am incredibly grateful for the weeks ahead.

I go to North Carolina in a couple of weeks to join with colleagues from around the national church to work at certifying the proficiency of those seeking to be ordained this year. Since there is a huge variety of ways that people are arriving at a theological education, the standards of expectation are very much in flux. In addition, the cost of offering a national examination is a factor for the whole Episcopal Church. Many dioceses have opted out of using the General Ordination Examination and are using locally created substitutes. Because priests are ordained for the whole Church and not simply for a particular congregation or diocese and because the teaching ministry of priesthood is so intrinsic to it, I believe there should be a "gold standard" to determine proficiency. There are big questions looming about this process, and I am proud to serve on the national General Board of Examining Chaplains.

On Shrove Tuesday, I will get the privilege of flipping pancakes, and burning palms. I am looking forward to sharing this festive occasion with Gooden School families. Some of you may recall that it was our custom for many years to have pancakes together.

And on Ash Wednesday, I will impose ashes in what is one of the most solemn moments of our life together. Lent, while penitential, is a deeper season for all of us. I find a different kind of joy in this season of self-reflection and restraint.

None of these activities would be possible without the community that is our parish family $\dot{}$ the Church of the Ascension. For all that I am blessed with, I give thanks to God.

was in hospital and rehab. Four weeks later, I am home now and recovering very well. The friendship and fellowship you gave both us will always be remembered.



Join us for House Church and Dinner on February 19th at 6:30pm at the Meehan family home. The sign-up sheet is on the Events Table in Hawks Hall.



Here's how to participate: on the weekdays of Lent, information is posted at http://www.lentmadness.org about two different saints. Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo.

If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

Lenten Class!


I am excited to share that I will be leading a class/bible study this Lenten season on The Epistle of James.

IT'S TRADITION! SHROVE TUESDAY

Most if us know that Shrove Tuesday occurs the first Tuesday before <u>Ash Wednesday</u>, and some of us know that it officially ends the season of <u>Epiphany</u>. But did you know it began as a vigil for the starting of Lent?

The word **shrove** is the past participle of the English verb **to shrive**, which means to confess and receive <u>absolution</u> for one's <u>sins</u> by way of <u>confession</u> and doing <u>penance</u>. During the week before Lent, sometimes called <u>Shrovetide</u> in English, Christians were expected to go to confession in preparation for the <u>penitential</u> season of turning to God.

Shrove Tuesday as we have come to know it originated during the Middle Ages. Food items like meats, fats, eggs, milk, and fish were regarded as restricted during Lent. To keep such food from being wasted, many families would have big feasts on Shrove Tuesday in order to consume those items that would inevitably become spoiled during the next forty days. The English tradition of eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way to use as much milk, fats, and eggs as possible before Ash Wednesday began.

So now that you know the history, plan on joining us <u>February 25</u> for Ascension's own interpretation of this old Anglican custom. It's Tradition!.





About Lent Madness

Lent Madness began in 2010 as the brainchild of the Rev. <u>Tim Schenck</u>. In seeking a fun, engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the Church's Calendar of Saints, Tim came up with this unique Lenten devotion. Combining his love of sports with his passion for the lives of the saints, Lent Madness was born on his blog "<u>Clergy Family Confidential</u>" which has subsequently moved locations and become "Clergy Confidential."

The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time and people vote for their favorite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch. If you're not sure about terminology, check out our glossary. It's free!

The major change from 2010 to 2011 was the introduction of four "celebrity bloggers" to champion particular saints through the Faithful Four. In 2012 we partnered with <u>Forward Movement</u> and Executive Director Scott Gunn to create our own website and broaden the number of people involved in the writing process, with Tim and Scott serving as the self-appointed Supreme Executive Committee.

Along the way we've added more celebrity bloggers, a poster-sized bracket, weekly Monday Madness videos, and the *Saintly Scorecard*, an annual publication containing all 32 first round bios, information about how to participate in Lent Madness as a congregation, and an essential Vocabulary List to decipher all things Lent Madness.

We've also inspired thousands of people along the way by forming an online community of people who are passionate about taking their faith but not themselves too seriously. Articles and spots about Lent Madness have appeared in the *Washington Post*, NPR, Huffington Post, FOXNews, NBC, USAToday, and even *Sports Illustrated*.

As Lent Madness continues to grow and evolve, what won't change is the essence of Lent Madness: allowing people to get to know some amazing people who have come before us in the faith and reminding one another that there's no reason for a dreary Lenten discipline. If this helps people connect with the risen Christ during this season of penitence and renewal, and have a bit of fun in the process, then it continues to be worthwhile. February \sim Groundhog Day, Candlemas, Super Bowl, Valentine's Day, Presidents' Day, Ash Wednesday \sim such a variety of celebrations, some of which will be observed at Ascension \sim

On **February 2**, we celebrate Candlemas, also known as the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus Christ and the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Since Jesus is the light of the world, many congregations bless candles on this day and hold candle-lit processions. The two anthems for this day reflect two aspects of Candlemas

Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies set by Frederick Candlyn to reflect Christ as the world's true light;

Nunc Dimittis by Frank Henry Shera ~ the Song of Simeon, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation ~ to be a light to lighten the Gentiles and to be the glory of thy people Israel.

In addition, on this day we'll be joined once again by the AlmaNova Duo, Jessica Pierce, flute, and Almer Imamovic, acoustic guitar, who will be playing the opening and closing voluntaries.

February 9 ~ Noel Goemanne's Whom Should I Fear and The Peace of God by John Rutter.

February 16 ~ I'll be out of town, so worship will be led by a substitute.

February 23 ~ the last Sunday after Epiphany ~

Christ Upon the Mountain Stands by Robert Lehman; Dmitri Bortniansky's Cherubim Song (No. 7).

O God, whom saints and angels delight to worship in heaven:
Be with us, we beseech thee, as we seek to perfect the praises of thy children on earth;
and grant to us even now such glimpses of thy beauty

What is Ash Wednesday and where did it originate?

The first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday comes the day after Shrove Tuesday. Traditionally a day of repentance, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent

At Ash Wednesday Masses and services, ashes are imposed on the foreheads of the faithful. The priest or minister marks the forehead of each participant with black ashes in the shape of a cross. Traditionally, the ashes come from the burning of the previous year's palms. At Ascension, parishioners bring the palms they have saved from last year to the church the week before Ash Wednesday. These are burned and used to create the ashes which Father Michael imposes on us. When applying the ashes, the priest says, "Remember, O man, that you are dust, and unto dust you shall return" to remind us of our mortality. After the service, a worshipper traditionally retains the cross until it wears off.



Lent has been observed as a preparation for Easter since the fifth century. In the medieval period, Ash Wednesday was the required annual day of penitential confession occurring after fasting and the remittance of the tithe.

Ashes were used in ancient times to express mourning. Dusting oneself with ashes was the penitent's way of expressing sorrow for sins and faults. Following that tradition, the Anglican Book of Common Prayer designates Ash Wednesday as a day of fasting.

Lent lasts 40 days not counting Sundays because by our tradition every Sunday is a little Easter.



Each month, my Spire article is written under the banner "Real Life. Real Faith." It is meant to conjure up some thought about practicing our faith in the real world. It's a means to get us thinking not just about our Sunday faith, but also our Monday through Saturday faith as well. In Matthew 4:12-23 (3rd Sunday of Epiphany) the gospel writer recounts the calling of disciples and their commissioning to join Jesus in proclaiming the good news.

Just as the disciples were called to be fishers of people for the Kingdom, we too are called to be ministers of the Gospel in our homes, our work, our community. Sorry folks, but it isn't

just a clergy thing – it's an all of us thing.

I'll be the first to acknowledge that it's no easy task being a minister of the gospel. All to often my inner conflicts, distrust, and dare I say personal prejudices (yes, clergy have them too) get in the way of my proclaiming the good news. It's a real battle sometimes to proclaim the good news when we're struggling to make sense of it to ourselves.

Ted Loder, in his book "Guerrillas of Grace: Prayers for the Battle" offers us this prayer to take into battle:

Sustain Me in the Coming Then ~

O God, empty me of angry judgement, and aching disappointments, and anxious trying,

and breathe into me something like quietness and confidence, that the lion and the lamb in me may lie down together and be led by a trust as

straightforward as a little child.

Catch my pride and doubt off guard that, at least for the moment, I may sense your presence and your caring, and be surprised by a sudden joy rising in me now to sustain me in the coming then.

Live well, live blessed, be sustained for the battle. Deacon Ed+
