

From the Rector

Parish Annual Meeting

The main work of the Annual Meeting is to elect new members of the Vestry and to receive the reports of the works of ministry. (The budget for the new year -2021 is passed by the Vestry in December and merely presented at the Annual Meeting.) The current Vestry members whose terms are coming to an end are willing to continue for the time being.

So... Tentatively, the date of the Annual Meeting is set for Sunday, February 28th.



Closing out 2020 and Welcoming 2021

It is now common to refer to 2020 as the year of catastrophe; and given the events of the prior twelve months, it is easy to see why. When I was asked to rejoin Vestry in March of 2020, I had no idea this would be the year of plague, economic distress, fire, and loss. Nevertheless, upon reflection if I had known what 2020 had in store, I would have rejoined Vestry sooner and bound myself even more tightly to our precious community.

In any given year, we or someone close to us may be subject to personal loss, economic hardship, the threat of natural disaster, or some combination of these trials; and for those impacted, these times are rightly remembered as catastrophic. What made 2020 different was that so many of us were affected at the same time by crises that were at once personal and universal. However, if 2020 was a time of greater hardship, then it was also the time that we bound ourselves closer to God and each other.

As the disasters of 2020 compounded one upon the other, I worried about how our church would weather the storms. Would collections drop causing a financial crisis? Would not worshiping at church stress our community to the breaking point? Would our clergy be overwhelmed by the toll of each successive crisis? These are the mundane worries of lay volunteers, and I for one excel at worrying.

But as the year progressed, my mundane worries became answered prayers:

- Our congregation remained faithful, and Ascension remained solvent. Indeed, our modest PPP loan was forgiven and
 will show as income on our 2020 books. Special thanks to Kim Lumino for not only maintaining the books, but also
 shepherding the PPP loan through approval and forgiveness.
- We discovered that we could share our services with the community online through Facebook Live and Zoom, and later in the year we were able to hold carefully planned and socially distanced outdoor services. Special thanks to Raymond Smith and Charlie Noecker for figuring out the technical side of online worship.
- · We are also thankful to Raymond for overseeing our buildings and grounds and keeping the fountain running.
- Our altar guild remained on the job, ensuring our worship continued to meet the high standards they have historically set for vesting our clergy and the church. Special thanks to Lynne Holl and her team.
- Finally, no matter what happened, we had music. Dr. Deb, Charlie Noecker, and the choir innovated, used technology, and delivered the music that elevates our worship and stirs the soul.

Now, as for overwhelming our clergy, I will let them speak to that; but I will say, I am astounded by and grateful for their love and dedicated service. Deacon Ed made it a point to visit the housebound and reach out to our youth, ensuring that no one was forgotten. Pastor Josh not only led us on Sunday mornings, but he and Jobi also gave us special mini-advent candles that allowed our parish families to enjoy Advent safely at home. Finally, thanks to Fr. Michael for shepherding our little flock through fire, flood, plague, and heartfelt losses. If Ascension is a boat, then 2020 was a hurricane; and in the midst of all of it, Fr. Michael calmly and confidently sailed a modest craft as only a seasoned skipper can.

I have no idea what 2021 has in store, but I do know that as a community we are stronger, smarter, and more resourceful than I had ever imagined; and it is also clear that we share a common love community and a faith in a God who is faithful to us. Given what we learned about our church and our faith in 2020, I am much more optimistic than ever about 2021.

The Verdant Greening of Joy

"The Word is living, being, spirit, all verdant greening, all creativity. This Word manifests itself in every creature. All living creatures are sparks from the radiation of God's brilliance, emerging from God like the rays of the sun."

— Hildegard of Bingen

Today we celebrate the commemoration of Saint Hildegard of Bingen, a woman offering so many gifts to the church that they are hard to list. Writer, composer, mystic, and saint. In thinking about her myriad accomplishments, and the beauty of her full scope of identity, I was struck by how joyful her pursuits seemed, especially her deep love for music, all of which came out of a life marked by illness and difficult living conditions.

Hildegard, adding even more to her list of identities, was an herbalist and healer. Even down to the sprout, she saw the verdant greening as a life bearing witness to the presence of God. Maybe it's that I don't feel safe entering buildings, but I've recently been drawn into a deeper fascination with the earth. I've become a bit of an armchair herbalist, wondering how much healing might be hidden in leaves. I'm remembering the buds and blossoms more frequently in my prayers, looking out the window searching for green, nurturing my very own plant with fear and wonder.

Right now, we are likely putting one foot in front of the other to get by; I say this because I don't know anyone who isn't just trying to make it from a present moment to any future. And there is nothing wrong with that. But Hildegard knew something we'd be wise to learn: joy is a part of survival. In the midst of illness, in the midst of challenge, in a time of famine, joy is not optional. Joy is the presence of hope during suffering, not the cherry on top of something already sought after. The reason joy is not optional is because it carries some of the energy we need to complete the journey from present moment to any future. Joy is also, and maybe most importantly, never as far away from us as we imagine. Even down to the sprout, we are shown the verdant greening that is an invitation into joy.

This is not meant to diminish pain, it is meant to offer hope in the midst of it. Joy as hope means it is less a hobby and more a prayer. Joy does not diminish pain; joy shows up as a balm to begin the healing process. I say joy is not optional, because we cannot opt out of the invitation from Jesus Christ to be given, even when it feels like the world is crashing down, the gift of a verdant green earth to receive the crashing.

I have experienced profound joy in two places known to Jesus: the Sea of Galilee and the Garden of Gethsemane. The Sea of Galilee held the cool, watered hope of calling, of vocation, of being drawn into the very chaos out of which God created order. The Garden of Gethsemane held the heavy, dense weight of waiting for death, but in that same truth, the hope that waiting for death means waiting for resurrection. Both were joy and neither were diminished by the other.

Hildegard knew joy in the midst of challenge; she wrote songs throughout illness. She gifts us with an invitation into joy that does not compete with our pain.

What is the church? There are a lot of answers to this question. A building. An institutional structure A gathered group of Christians. Over the years and centuries, the church in all its forms has looked different in varied times and places.

During this time of pandemic, the church looks different. I take comfort in knowing that the church has always been on a bit of a journey. So it need not shock us that things look different now.

Of course, this doesn't take away our grief at missing things that we cannot now have. I dearly miss receiving Holy Communion. And I yearn for the day when I can belt out a hymn with a full congregation. Still, we know that Jesus Christ is present in the church, even when the church looks different from what we are used to or what we prefer. Thanks be to God.

I've been thinking about all this. How can we carry on the essential aspects of church life even when we can't gather—or when we can only gather in very limited ways?

Worship is surely a more satisfying experience in a full church, but we can worship in our homes. We can tune into a webcast, but we can also just grab our prayer book and offer our prayers and praises individually or with others in our household.

We can offer our daily prayers and we can read scripture on our own, or with an online group. We can support mission outreach and social justice work with our financial gifts or in other ways, even if we can't get together with our usual team at church.

In other words, the church can thrive now. Many congregations have discovered this, and they have adapted to our present reality. It's possible that we won't ever go back to the way things were in 2019. Maybe online daily prayers are here to stay. Maybe online bible studies are going to stick around. Time will tell.

But we also have to be mindful of all the ways we are leaving people out. Are we supporting people in worship who do not have internet access? Are we using online tools to support worship and learning in life-giving ways? We at Forward Movement have been looking for gaps—places where local churches might need help. We think we found one, and we have an answer.

A new offering called "This is NOT Sunday School" will launch in mid-September. Hosted by ChurchNext and taught by our friends at Forma, this is a new online, weekly, free, and intergenerational way to learn together. Your family—whatever your ages—can gather and learn some of the great stories of the Bible together. Learn more and sign up at the ChurchNext website.

This is one example of a creative solution to how we need to grow into this new time. I wonder what other needs you see? Are there ways in which the church can thrive in ways it has never grown?

We're watching, listening, and praying here at Forward Movement. We want to inspire disciples and empower evangelists now as ever.
