## From the Rector

As almost everyone knows, houses of worship have been given a green light to re-open with some very strict guidelines. Our bishop, The Right Reverend John Taylor, has issued a pastoral letter with some more guidelines for the congregations in our diocese. (Some of you may know that I was part of the group that put together those diocesan guidelines.)

Your Vestry began addressing the questions about re-opening two weeks ago. We still have more work to do before we can re-open in a safe and responsible way. (It should be noted that the Bishop's pastoral letter makes it very clear that no congregation "has" to re-open, and I'm sure many will remain closed for a longer period of time.)

The Bishop has directed that the earliest re-opening date will be June 21st. The rationale for this date is that we want to learn from the experience of other churches that re-open on Pentecost. If there appear to be new clusters of infections in two to three weeks due to religious gatherings, the State of California may rescind the permission to re-open. Always, our highest value is love for one another, and we want to be a part of the solution and not the problem.

For the foreseeable future, we will continue to live stream worship at Ascension. I know that many of our parishioners, especially those at risk or who are vulnerable, will want to remain home; and we trust everyone will make the best choice for themselves and their loved ones. Already we have a team at work improving the quality of our livestreaming.

Provided we are able to meet the requirements for re-opening, I have chosen to try our first "in person" worship on Sunday, June 28<sup>th</sup> at 9 am. Some of you may recall, the last Sunday of June has been our traditional celebration of "Mass on the Grass." This event dates back to June of 1991 when we gathered outside on the Sunday following the Sierra Madre Earthquake. This year, we will again be outside in our worship space on the south side of the church.



Obviously, there will be new considerations. Everyone will have to be wearing a mask. There are no exceptions to this rule. If for health reasons someone can't wear a mask, they should stay at home. If a person shows up who is adamant that they won't wear a mask and won't leave, the service will be cancelled. Physical distancing will be observed. Hand sanitizer will be available and used. There will be directions to be followed. If we can do this right, and safely, then we can consider moving back inside the sanctuary.

I know for some, staying at home is the best choice. But I also know some are longing to be in the same space as the community we call our Ascension family. Again, love is our primary value, and safety is my primary concern.
