From the Rector

I recently came across this photo of the Church of the Ascension on an old postcard from some time between 1950 and 1968. It was taken after the church was expanded and before the sign on the right was replaced by the stone sign. You'll notice the bright red trim.

It has been decided that we will be painting the front doors of the church red to match the new red sign out in front. This will, of course, be consistent with a long-standing tradition in the Episcopal Church.

Red doors on churches date back to the Middle Ages, and like many traditions that go so far back, the original rationale may have gotten misplaced. Some would say that the red symbolizes the blood shed by Christ, which is our entry into salvation. Red represents the blood of the martyrs, which, as early church father Tertullian pointed out, became the seeds of the church. Red is the color of the Passion. Coming through red doors reminds us of the death and resurrection. Others say that it is the color associated with the Passion. Still others hold that it is reminiscent of the marking of the doors at Passover and the color is also associated with Pentecost. One modern day front runner theory is that the red doors connote sanctuary. In the Middle Ages, churches were places where a person could seek refuge for justice.

A modern re-interpretation could be that we all need some place where we can find safety and healing. (A pretty cynical opinion holds that the doors get painted red when the mortgage on the church is paid off. I'm not buying that idea.) This variety of theories is so typically Episcopalian/Anglican – if you ask three people for their thoughts, you'll get at least five ideas!

In the photograph, it is hard to tell if the doors were red as well as the surrounding trim. If one goes to look at the actual door under the bell tower and the door exiting the sanctuary by the apse, it is apparent that at one time those doors were red as well. So perhaps by Pentecost, we'll be looking at red doors.

Perry Restoration Project News

Many of you may recall the generous challenge presented to the congregation at our Annual Meeting by Martha Mulleavy. (In a show and tell moment, she passed around rocks that had fallen off the church's siding!) Through her generous contribution, work has begun on a multi-faceted restoration project.

Doors that have been in serious deterioration will be replaced or repaired. The exterior brown trim will be repaired and repainted. The grout work, sometimes called the pointing, on our rock work will be attended to, and the panels with the rocks inset will be repaired.

In light of Martha's family's long history at Ascension – her great-grandfather was William Carson Shaw (Rector from 1919 -1925) and her grandfather was Charles Hall Perry (longtime parishioner and Vestry member) - we're calling this restoration the Perry Restoration Project.

Rule of Life

A Rule of Life is an ancient tradition. I was not familiar with this ancient concept until I recently read an article in Grow Christians, an on-line publication of Forward Movement. I thought you might be interested.

"A Rule of Life is simply a series of letters we write to ourselves to keep us on the path we want to take." It "is a fancy, ancient, and religious term for a simple collection of 'notes to self' that you write and read back to yourself once a day as a reminder of how you want to live your life.

If you want to coach yourself on ten subjects (for example: money, rest, health, food, work, prayer, friendship, exercise, kindness, and play) then you write ten topics" — each one on a separate page. "Expand each topic" by writing a series of descriptive "paragraphs about your hope for that subject in your life", or find a number of relevant sayings that speak to you on the topic, or even paste a picture or two on that page. "Then you simply read the ten pages, one a day, for ten days, and repeat.

Many people write thirty notes to self because that is about one each day for a month. At the end of the month, you go back to page one and begin reading the statements again. In a year you read each page about


twelve times. This way you never go for more than a month without being reminded of the top thirty things you think are important to your living a good life." *

- ⇒ Congregational Lectors (scripture readers) are another need. One service every month or two is the time commitment. Talk to Maggie Outhouse or Father Michael
- ⇒ Work Party volunteers One Saturday every so often. Talk to Mike Beach about the next Work Saturday. Weeders are always welcome. Set your own schedule. Talk with Mike Beach if you need directions.

Where you can help the community beyond Ascension

- ⇒ Donate food the first Sunday of the month for the ECPAC food distribution
- ⇒ Donate clothing for the Women's Room clothing drive
- ⇒ Contribute to Episcopal Relief and Development
- ⇒ Participate in our various Outreach projects throughout the year

Well, I can't help but wonder how many of you decided to include your junk drawers as part of your spring cleaning. What spring cleaning....is he crazy? OK, lets forget the spring cleaning and peek into our rational junk drawers and see what we find.

Why do we have relational junk drawers? It's the dark place in our hearts where we stuff people when we don't know how to deal with their quirks or shortcomings. It's the scary place in our soul where we hide our true feelings out of fear of rejection or conflict. It's the

procrastinating and dishonest place in our minds where we tell ourselves, "I'll deal with him or her tomorrow."

On the one hand, it's an easy way out when we don't want to or don't know how to deal with the difficult people in our lives. Or is it?

People are not junk. They are valuable beings created in the image of God. All people. Regardless of how difficult a relationship is, you must keep at it because people matter and relationships matter. When it comes to people, out of sight does not necessarily mean out of mind. Stuffing is never the path to relational success. (Have you noticed that people tend to crawl out of the "drawers" we stuff them into?) Ignoring a problem or not being honest with a person doesn't solve anything. Like your momma told you when you were eight, "Honesty is always the best policy." We need to be straightforward with people and honest with ourselves. You shouldn't be lazy in your relationships. It might be easier to ignore a person who bothers or scares you, but that's not the path to personal or relational health. Relationships are work. Hard work.

Who in your life, despite your best efforts to run from them, is impossible to avoid? Maybe it's time to face the junk in your heart and the stuff hidden and unspoken in your relationship with that person.

Living with fear or tension or undercurrents of strife isn't good for you or anybody else.

Go ahead and make some time to open the drawer and face the person you've been avoiding. Stop hiding or running from that relationship. Don't put off until tomorrow what is best dealt with today. Embrace the challenges and grow.

Live well, live blessed, live out in the open. And by the way, God's watching.
