#### From the Rector

I want to thank everybody who contributed during Lent to Episcopal Relief and Development. Our effort had two prongs – First the popular Chicken project. We raised \$539.66 from the Church of the Ascension to support the international branch of the organization. The other prong was the Lenten offerings which went to support the U.S. Disaster Fund. The congregation raised \$840 towards this fund. Episcopal Relief and Development is currently supporting recovery efforts in Florida, North Carolina, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Washington, Texas, Alabama, California, Nebraska and South Dakota.

I also want to thank our congregation for your support of me and my ministry as a Partner in Response. Some of you may know I made a short trip just before Holy Week to Nebraska and Iowa in response to the flooding that has been going on there. I met with diocesan leaders, local clergy and lay leaders, toured some of the affected areas, and helped launch a grant-funded response program.



Floods in the mid-west always raise complicated questions. Why do some communities flood and others don't? Is it appropriate to rebuild in flood-prone areas? What





is the impact on agriculture? Something that struck me as different in this region was the amount of sand that was deposited by the Platte River overflowing. This deposit will have an impact on the topsoil that was under water.

Please keep the people of the region in your prayers. Pray for wisdom in the recovery efforts. And again, thank you for your support.



#### NOTES FROM THE LOFT

As I write this article, the music of Easter Day still rings in my head ~ song from the bulging loft soaring throughout the sanctuary, descants, trumpet, oboe, organ, zimbelstern. Sincere appreciation goes to the choir and instrumentalists for their gift of time, talent, and considerable effort!

During May, our choral celebration of Easter continues:

May 5 ~ Third Sunday of Easter

Two anthems by contemporary American composer David Ashley White: A Song to the Lamb and O God Unseen.

May 12 ~ Fourth Sunday of Easter, Good Shepherd Sunday

We observe Good Shepherd Sunday with Edward Bairstow's gorgeous The King of Love My Shepherd Is. Bairstow was an Anglican organist and composer of the late  $19^{th}$  and early  $20^{th}$  centuries. This is paired with My Shepherd Will Supply My Need by contemporary American composer, Carlton T. Russell ~ a setting new to Ascension.

May 19 ~ Fifth Sunday of Easter

Blessed Be the God and Father by Samuel Sebastian Wesley,  $19^{th}$  century English organist and composer. During communion Peter Aston's I Give You A New Commandment will be sung.

May 26 - Sixth Sunday of Easter, Rogation Sunday

An Ascension premier, *Beauty in God's Creation* by A. F. Schultz, is the offertory anthem. Schultz is a contemporary American organist, composer, and conductor. This will be coupled with Cecil Armstrong Gibbs' *God Be In My Head*. Gibbs, who died in 1960, was a prolific and versatile English composer. Since this is also Memorial Day Weekend, we'll include the singing of the *Navy Hymn, Eternal Father, Strong to Save.*

LIFE. Real Faith.

Ready or not, here I come. Post resurrection gospel stories are full of hope, new life and, in my opinion, a little bit of mischief. I can't help but think that Jesus may have been having a little bit of fun with the disciples whether it was on the road to Emmaus or in the upper room where the apostles were confused, lost, and even in a deep state of despair not knowing what to do next. They were hiding, not knowing Jesus would soon be seeking.

Maybe they were lacking in faith and taking things a little too seriously. Perhaps at times, we are too. Remember playing Hide and Seek in which any number of players conceal themselves waiting to be found by one or more seekers. At times, we play that hide and seek game with God; and that's okay as long as we remember that sooner or later we'll hear him say, "Ready or not here I come." And when he finds you or tags you - you're it.

Recently I had one of those ready or not experiences. I thought I knew how I felt about the issue of immigration, our undocumented brothers and sisters, and immigration policies in general. And then this...

I live on a culturally diverse quite dead-end street in Highland Park. The predominate demographic of Highland Park is Hispanic, but that demographic is changing rapidly. Diversity is one of the main reasons that brought me here ten years ago. I've learned a lot about myself and Hispanic culture, and recently I was reminded that try as I may to not view my neighborhood through the eyes of privilege, sometimes I do without thinking about it. And that's when I need Jesus the most to say "ready or not here I come...or better yet, here I am."

At 6:30 A.M. on Good Friday morning, ICE agents arrested my neighbor, removing him from his home cuffed in front of his wife and two small children ages 2 and 9. He is currently in prison in the desert, waiting to appear before an immigration judge in the town of Adelanto with a population of 30,000, three incarceration facilities, and no McDonald's.

I'm sharing this story because there's an important lesson to be learned. A common everyday headline suddenly took on a human face. It was my neighbor, my friend, and the husband and father of people I care about. I was asked to write a character reference letter which I joyfully and readily wrote. But here's the kicker...I could have been describing myself in the letter, and that made me smile. When we view others through the eyes of Jesus and see ourselves in their pain and in their need...that's a real privilege. Then and only then do the words of Pope Francis truly make sense: "Who am I to judge?"

Like children playing hide and seek, we too as disciples can be confused, lost, and not always sure about what we believe or what we are being called to do. We may think we're hiding from our Christian response and that Jesus doesn't notice, but he will always seek us out one way or another.

In this season of post resurrection, I heard Jesus loud and clear. My neighbor cried out "Here I am." I heard and I listened. God tagged me, and I knew what to do next. So, if you're playing hide n seek get ready...you may be next to be tagged.

#### A Meditation on Ascension Day...



This year May 30 is Ascension Day, our titular name day. As a parish, we traditionally celebrate Ascension Day the Sunday directly following the official day. In 2016, **Forward Movement**, a publication of **Forward Day by Day**, Executive Director Scott Gunn shared the following meditation about Christ's Ascension.

"Jesus offered a blessing that day in at least two ways. First, he lifted his hands and blessed them. Even more than this, his very departure is a kind of blessing. You see, when Jesus left his followers, he showed a great deal of trust. Jesus' departure demonstrated that he trusted them – and us—to continue his ministry. Jesus trusts us. And trust is a blessing.


Perhaps the point of Ascension Day is that the burden of ministry shifts to us to carry on Christ's work, equipped and inspired by the Holy Spirit. We can't do this on our own, of course, but by God's grace we can.

When we celebrate Ascension Day, we are celebrating the fact that Jesus has given us the gift of trust and the joys of carrying on his ministry."

Trust and joy - something for all of us to think about as we celebrate Christ's Ascension once again.

#### **Construction Notice**

City of Sierra Madre FY 2018-19 Street Improvement Project
4/15/19

The City of Sierra Madre recently awarded the above referenced contract to Gentry Brothers. Inc. We will be resurfacing your neighborhood. This work is tentatively scheduled to commence on **Monday**, **April 22**, **2019** with an anticipated completion date of **June 21**, **2019**. Working hours will be restricted from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

As can be expected with any street improvement project, there may be some noise, dust and inconvenience. However, we will make every effort to keep this to a minimum.

Parking will be restricted in the construction area between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. We will post "No Parking" signs at least 48 hours in advance prior to commencing work in the affected areas. The City will be forced to tow parked vehicles in the construction zone where any work is impeded. Access to your driveway will be maintained except the day paving is scheduled. We will deliver a second notice 24 hours prior to paving.

We truly appreciate your understanding and patience so that we can complete this work as quickly as possible. We thank you for your cooperation.
