From the Rector

There are many places around our campus that are dear to many of us. Our beautiful sanctuary is one of the places that immediately comes to mind. It is so visually unique that it is very memorable. Almost every week, we have tourists come by on a "The Fog" pilgrimage, and these visitors always want to see the interior of the church.

Another place that is very special to many of us is the Memorial Garden. We have dozens of loved ones buried there. More than a year ago, we began an effort to enhance the Memorial Garden. New roses were planted, the rock work was improved, and the area around the fountain was redone. A plaque attributing the fountain to Lew Watanabe was also installed.

Now facing us is the challenge of cracks and spaces in the Garden path where the slabs of concrete have shifted. These cracks, of course, are a safety hazard, one that is only going to get worse. We have a plan to address this situation. Our Memorial Garden maintenance guy — Darren Odin — is cutting the concrete in the affected spots, and those spaces will be filled with flat stones very similar to the stones on the south side of the church. Once the flagstones set, the cracks and uneven spots will be leveled out. Needless to say, this endeavor will cost money.

I invite you to help with this cost by making a specific contribution to the Memorial Garden Fund. At this time of year, we should all be prayerfully considering our giving to the church in general and to the specific needs of this special place.



A Note on Financial Stewardship

You know that your financial pledge is essential to keeping the Church of the Ascension supportive and strong. It allows us to budget for the coming year and helps us determine our priorities. But you may not be aware of the many ways you can provide financial support to our parish. First off, you should be getting a pledge card in the mail or you can pick one up at church. Return the card to us in the offering plate at one of the services or drop it off at the parish office. You can also make your pledge on the parish website by going to https://www.ascension-sierramadre.com/give.html.

When fulfilling your pledge by check or cash, make sure your name and envelope/account number are clearly marked. To get your offering to church you can:

- ♦ Drop an envelope with cash or a check into the offering plate during the service
- Call the office and drop a donation off with Kim Lumino at any time during the week (except Wednesdays)
- Arrange on your bank's website for Ascension to receive automatic payments from your checking or savings account in the amount you designate. Simply add "Church of the Ascension, 25 E. Laurel Avenue, Sierra Madre, CA 91024" as an automatic payee in the amount and frequency you choose. When prompted for an account number, you can use your Ascension envelope/account number.



In addition, you can donate outside of your pledge by donating:

- A financial gift to support a parish project like the roof replacement or other maintenance
- Appreciated Stock. If you have appreciated stock, you may donate that to the parish and get a tax deduction while avoiding capital gains. Check with the parish office for more information and your accountant for details on the tax implications
- A car. Over the last few years, Ascension has accepted cars as donations with approximately 70% of the proceeds going to the church. Call the parish office for details
- ♦ Planned giving. When creating your will or trust, please remember your parish family in your arrangements.

"Between the Masses" Discussion Group

I began my last homily with the following question I find myself asking over and over again: "What gets in the way of my loving my neighbor – of me loving you?" Perhaps it's fear; perhaps it's panic. To that I would add, perhaps its **anger** and not knowing what to do with my anger.

We often get the message that anger is what our spiritual practices should be able to get rid of, that we should be able to transform it into pure sweet compassion. But what if instead of seeing anger as an abhorrent emotional state, we considered the spiritual meaning of anger. What if we viewed anger not as an enemy, but as a dear friend? Understanding the spiritual meaning of anger and accepting its message can be liberating.

Anger, writes psychotherapist Robert Augustus Masters in his book Spiritual Bypassing, is "the primary emotional state that functions to uphold our boundaries." When we feel anger, it's an indication that something is wrong—a boundary has been crossed or a need is not being met. It's not always just about our individual selves either—anger is the appropriate response to oppression. (from my October 29, 2023 homily: setting boundaries is a valid Christian response).

Anger is an emotion like any other, and we have as much right to feel it as to feel sadness or joy. Actually, we have about as much "right" to feel any emotion as we do to experience hunger or thirst. We don't choose what to feel; we just feel. Our choice lies in what we do with the emotion.

Many spiritual traditions, Masters explains, insist we transform our anger into compassion, implying that anger is not a "spiritual" emotion. This idea confuses anger with aggression, the emotion with "what is actually done with anger." Anger can actually be an expression of compassion, a willingness to uphold boundaries that are sacred or to stand up for someone who is being oppressed. Compassion and anger can absolutely coexist.

Anger is not an action, though one of its characteristics may be the urge to do something and to do it fast. Anger can help us overcome fear in order to take some action. So how do we know what action to take?

First, we must slow down. We must be still. Being still is incredibly challenging.

There are two types of anger. Righteous anger is very calm and grounded and knows exactly what must be done. It's also very rare. Much more common is anxious anger, which is fidgety and confused, impatient for action. This response usually comes because anxious anger is mixed up with fear or hurt (or both), and the anger is trying to find a way out of feeling those other things. Sitting still enables those other emotions to surface.

And so, we must sit still. We must listen to the message of the anger even if all it knows is that something is wrong. We have to give it a chance to talk to us, to dialogue with it, even ask it some questions. What boundary has been crossed? What needs can we address right now? Can we be honest about those needs while showing compassion for the other person's viewpoint?

Anger may be quick to place blame on someone else; but if we can slow down enough to try to identify what boundaries have been crossed, we may be able to see the situation more clearly with compassion for ourselves and others.

In Masters's view, spirituality is not about finding ways to avoid or eradicate our feelings. Its work is deeply emotional in nature, and it's about getting close enough to ourselves that we can see to the heart of what's happening, be honest about it, and care for ourselves and each other to the best of our ability. Rejecting our emotions is not the path. Listening closely to the messages of the heart and honoring them, even and especially when they are uncomfortable to sit with—that's the spiritual meaning of anger.

All quantities given are approximate. Feel free to adjust based on your recipe and experience. Each food item contribution should include approximately 20-25 servings and should arrive in a DISPOSABLE foil half-size steam pan (approx. 12"x10"x4") or full-size steam pan (approx. 20"x12"x3").
