From the Rector

People often ask what it is that I do when I'm deployed as Partner in Response for Episcopal Relief and Development. Frequently, I describe myself as a consultant to church leaders. Usually, I travel with another member of our team.

This past month, I went to the Diocese of Texas and spent time in and around Houston. I met with their Diocesan Disaster Coordinator, some of their program Canons, and their Assistant Bishop – the Right Reverend Hector Monterosso, as well as several local clergy and lay leaders.

This trip I was accompanied by Keith Adams. Keith has served for the last several years as the Disaster Manager for the Diocese of New Jersey. (One of the things we have in common is that we are both retired fire chiefs.) Together, we visited some of the affected congregations and met with diocesan staff. In addition, for a couple of days I "shadowed" Bishop Monterosso. We visited Latino clergy and lay leaders.

Normally, I don't spend much time with some of the folks who have been badly affected. This time, Bishop Hector and I were asked by a priest to accompany him

in visiting one of his parishioners. She has lived in a ground floor apartment and is quite the "pack rat." Her apartment was filled with stuff that had been soaked during the flooding and were now a real health hazard. The goal was to convince her to let go of her collections and be able to move to a clean apartment. Sadly, convincing her will be an effort that will take more than a one-time visit. We did our best, and who knows what effect praying with "Nila" will have.

An Important Message from Your Vestry

Ascension is blessed with volunteers who give of themselves to provide services when funding is not available. But our Church needs a commitment from all members of the parish to support our day-to-day operations. Ascension offers so much to its parishioners; it would be a shame if some of these services could no longer be provided.

Because we can only fund salaries, services, and programs with money we are guaranteed to receive, the budget is developed primarily by the pledges made by our parishioners. Financially, we do need to increase our pledge donations. This past year, those pledges fell \$20,121 short of what is needed in a bare bones budget. Due to the deaths of three of our pledging members, that amount may increase to \$30,000. Those who can afford to increase their pledges are encouraged to do so.

A Theology of Scarcity vs The Theology of Abundance - Which Do You Believe?

The theology of abundance has its roots in various New Testament passages including Paul's letter to the Philippians ("I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. . . . I can do all things through him who strengthens me. . . . And my God will fully satisfy every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus." 4:12, 13 and 19). St. Paul saw a church with limited resources struggling for its life. Rather than accept a survival mentality, Paul urges the Philippians to reach out. He assures them that God will provide and that the resources to carry out the church's mission are found in God's grace and the talents of the congregation.

Like the Philippians, we have two choices: to accept a theology of scarcity or to embrace a theology of abundance. A theology of scarcity assumes that resources are limited, the economy is bad, the world is closing in, and the limits of resources should determine the mission of our church. A theology of abundance believes that God is able to provide, that the resources are available, and that God is waiting to bestow those resources in response to our call.

According to Stanley Hauerwas, Professor of Theological Ethics and Law at Duke University, "Abundance, not scarcity, is the mark of God's kingdom. But that abundance must be made manifest through the lives of a people who have discovered that they can trust God and one another." In other words, without trust in God and in our neighbors and without sharing ourselves with each, we cannot attain the abundance God offers us. We must be willing to commit to abundance. By giving of ourselves and our treasure, we gain greater treasures.



Do You Know Me?

I've been attending Ascension on a regular basis with my family for approximately 7 years. My husband Dan and I and our 4 kids attend the 10:15 service. You probably know my face and can recognize my family, but do you KNOW me? Do I know you?

Fostering a sense of community in a church is critical for maintaining the energy and life of that congregation. And given my own personal experience of feeling on the periphery, I know that--at least for me, and possibly others who struggle with inclusion--there needs to be some intentional action taken. So when Lisa stepped down from heading up the Fellowship Ministry, I felt it my duty to step up. And yet, I feel overwhelmed with the task, so I've been hanging back. I am busy. I WANT to help. I WANT to lead. I WANT to creatively and dutifully usher in a better sense of belonging and community between each of us. But I can't do it without a lot of help.

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Where Does My Money Go?



Each month we have indicated the funds that are allocated in our Operating Budget which allow the Church to function. We have also stressed the importance of volunteerism which is so necessary to keep expenses down. This month, we are looking at **Administration**. From a financial output, we designate **\$38,995** to this program. Monies are used for the following: •Parish Administrator compensation •bookkeeping and printing •telephone, mobile, and internet •advertising and •postage.

The Parish Administrator position, currently held by Kim Lumino, is vital in helping the Church run smoothly. This part time position has an enormous job description. It includes everything from answering the phones, understanding computer complexities, keeping account of our financial records, etc. We are also blessed with numerous volunteers who provide much needed support.
